GORMAN HOUSE DETOXIFICATION UNIT

Since 2005, through a partnership with St Vincent's Hospital, the NSW branch of the Order of Malta, has been supporting Gorman House in Sydney. fit were not for the NSW Branch's financial assistance Gorman House would have been unable to continue functioning 7 days a week, 365 days a year. The branch also organises volunteers for the BBQs that are held three times a week to socialise with residents. Volunteer Sarah L'Huillier shares her experiences.

Gorman House is a 20-bed, non-medical residential detoxification unit at St Vincent's Hospital in Sydney. It provides a safe and supportive environment for some of Sydney's most needy and marginalised people to withdraw from alcohol and drugs. It is a short-term detoxification program, provided free of charge with the general length of stay being 5 days.

I became a volunteer at Gorman House when I moved from Melbourne to Sydney. My father, Leon, is a member of The Order in Melbourne and suggested that I might like to help with the volunteer program at Gorman House. I am often rostered with various members of The Order and their families, especially the Kirby family.

The BBQs provide a social atmosphere that helps the residents to relax. There are always residents, particularly men, who are keen to cook the BBQ. Friendly debates often take place around

It is on one hand lovely to see them again, to know that they have a place that they can return to, but it is also a sad reminder that they are still battling their addiction.

The staff at Gorman House, led by Charlie Lay, are inspiring, passionate and committed to helping the residents who often comment on how supportive and wonderful the staff are. They know that

URBAN SANCTUARY PROVIDES ASSISTANCE TO THE VULNERABLE AND NEEDY

The Order of Malta often works in conjunction with other charitable organisations to fulfil its mission of assisting the sick and the poor. In South Australia the Members support the Adelaide (Moore St) Day Centre, a charity that offers rehabilitation programs to homeless men over 25 and housing and welfare assistance to thousands of people each year.



As part of the Centre's rehabilitation program, a vegetable garden was established by the Centre in the mid '90's using an unwanted piece of land. The Order's support has provided tipper trailers, brushcutters, mowers, rainwater tanks and building materials for the garden.

This oasis of beauty, vegetables, fruit, chickens, lambs and beehives gives the disadvantaged participants a sense of purpose as they work together to feed the needy. It also enables the men

to regain skills they once had or assist them finding new ones to learn and develop.

In addition to providing a beautiful sanctuary and therapy for the residents, the garden grows organic fruit and vegetables that are then distributed to people in need.

"By offering the participants purposeful work that also assists others, it helps them see the worth of their own achievements" explains Dr. Ian Leitch RFD, the Order's Hospitaller in SA. "It also provides them with a sense of belonging as they witness the achievements of those they work with."

Over the last 10 years the Order's fundraising has generated over \$50,000 for the centre through various fundraising activities, including a popular movie night held every October. Particular mention must go to the Macquarie Group Foundation, who have contributed \$31,000 towards the project, after matching the fundraising efforts and personal donations of its Adelaide staff members, one of whom is a member of the Order.

UPCOMING LOURDES DAY MASS CELEBRATIONS

In the first weekend of May every year, Members of the Order from all over the world travel to Lourdes to accompany the sick and disabled to pray and bathe in the holy waters. Because the journey to France is often arduous and expensive many Australians are unable to make the pilgrimage. Consequently in addition to making the pilgrimage to Lourdes themselves, Australian members of the Order of Malta arrange annual Lourdes Day Masses in the capital cities for Australian Malades (the sick) unable to travel to Lourdes.

The Masses are celebrated in Melbourne. Sydney, Perth, Adelaide and Brisbane with generous support of the Archbishops and Diocesan staff and attract thousands of attendees each year throughout Australia.

"It is one way Members perform our obligation to serve the poor and sick", explains the Order's Australian President Tony Macken AM. "Whether at Lourdes or assisting at a Lourdes Day Mass in Australia we are privileged to be servants of those the Order has always called "Our Lords the Poor and the Sick".

DONORS PROVIDE INFRASTRUCTURE FOR TIMOR-LESTE **HUMANITARIAN SHIPMENTS**

Since 2002 the Order has been providing humanitarian support to the people of Timor-Leste. This has frequently included the shipment of pharmaceuticals, hospital equipment and vehicles from Australia to Timor-Leste. Logistically this has been very difficult and time-consuming to coordinate.

Thankfully, three supporters of the Order's work in Timor-Leste have stepped forward to provide facilities and equipment to assist with this process.

Mr Carlo Randazzo has generously provided warehouse space in Darwin for use by the Order. The warehouse will take receipt of supplies from around the country and store them while they await the shipment to Dili.

As a many of the consignments contain pharmaceuticals, Mr Kevin Malouf, Managing Director at Price and Speed Pty Ltd, has donated a refrigerated container to store medicines delivered to the warehouse in Darwin.

Mr Alan Jape JP, Group Managing Director at the Jape Group Australia has also generously provided a warehouse in Dili to receive the shipments when they arrive in Timor-Leste. From here the consignments are distributed to clinics around the country.

"These generous gifts mean that we now have an efficient infrastructure to support the ongoing supply of pharmaceuticals and equipment to

clinics in Timor-Leste' said David Scarf AM, Ambassador of the Order of Malta to the Democratic Republic of Timor-Leste. "Not only does this facilitate the logistics of the shipments, but the cost saving is substantial. It will greatly assist us in carrying out our work serving the poor and the sick in Timor. On behalf of the Order of Malta, I would like to thank these individuals for their generosity."
