A new project by the Order of Malta Philippines has provided 15,000 shoes to disadvantaged adults and children. Many of the recipients have never had a shoe.


There are many diseases contracted and spread due to bare feet, especially for those who commonly walk and run in the water. The most prevalent among them are soil-transmitted helminth, hookworms and schistosomiasis.

Not only do the shoes prevent the spread of disease, they provide the owner with dignity and opportunities to participate in work and other activities that may not of

The project would not have been possible without the generous support of Vans Philippines who donated the shoes and our Order of Malta Members and




volunteers who ensure each recipient is

The Hon Greg Smith SC, former Attorney General in NSW and Judge Dyson Heydon covered threats to religious Liberty and the need for legal protection for religious freedom respectively. The final session for the opening day featured Commissioner Robert Fitzgerald who served on the Royal Commission into the Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. His reflections on this Commission was extremely powerful and Bishop Vincent Long, Bishop of Parramatta, also spoke on the response of the Church in the aftermath of the Royal Commissions findings and both speakers answered questions from the assembly attendees in an open forum.

The opening day of the Assembly closed with a Vigil Ceremony at St. Mary's Cathedral followed by a welcome dinner for attendees at the Royal Sydney Golf Club.

The second day of the Assembly, featured talks from Members of the Order, providing updates and reports on internal activities, charitable works, volunteering activities and Ambassador reports. Guest speaker Monica Doumit, Director of Public Affairs and Engagement from the Archdiocese of Sydney spoke on increasing the role of women in the Church, and members of the Order, Francine and Byron Pirola, who are also Directors of the Marriage Resource Centre addressed the assembly on 'Defending the things that matter'.

The conference segment of the assembly was wrapped up by Damian Wyld, the

Order's Hospitaller to South Australia and the former CEO of Marriage Alliance. His session focused on 'where to from here for our Order' and discussed practical and effective responses to key issues that emerged from the presentations.

Delegates then attended an investiture ceremony at St Benedict's, Broadway, with His Grace Archbishop Fisher as the principal celebrant. 15 new Members were invested and Confrere Justin Harkiewicz took the Promise of Obedience to become a member of the Subpriory of the Immaculate Conception.

A formal dinner followed with the Hon John Howard OM AC, former Prime Minister made an after dinner address. He spoke about religious freedom in Australia and discussed implications of attempts to remove current exemptions in antidiscrimination to religious schools and also questioned the right of businesses to make a person's religious beliefs subject to an employment contract. He was hopeful the new Morrison government would act to protect religious freedoms and that this would receive bipartisan support.

"If parents send their children to denominational schools because they want a Catholic education, or a Jewish education, or an Anglican education then they are entitled to have that delivered it's as simple as that and I think that's a proposition that most people support."

## THE CHAPTER GENERAL OF THE **SOVEREIGN ORDER OF MALTA** HAS BEEN HELD IN ROME

Chaired by Grand Master Fra' Giacomo Dalla Torre del Tempio di Sanguinetto, the Chapter General of the Sovereign Order of Malta was held in the Magistral Villa in Rome on 1 and 2 May.

Convened every five years, it has the task of electing the members of the Sovereign Council (the Order's government), the Government Council and the Board of Auditors.

62 of the Order's representatives from the five continents took part in the Chapter General. These included 25 religious of the Order, the outgoing members of the

Sovereign Council, the Prelate and the heads of the principal national bodies.

For the first time, three Dames, heads of the Associations of Argentina, Scandinavia and Singapore, were present among the Chapter Members. Australian Member Prof David Kissane was also in attendance.

Fra' Ruy Gonçalo do Valle Peixoto de Villas Boas has been elected to the office of Grand Commander, Superior of the Order's religious members. Albrecht Freiherr von Boeselager has been confirmed as Grand Chancellor, Head of the Executive and Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Dominique Prince de La Rochefoucauld-Montbel and János Count Esterhazy de Galantha have been confirmed as Grand Hospitaller and Receiver of the Common Treasure, respectively.

# 61ST INTERNATIONAL **LOURDES PILGRIMAGE** OF THE ORDER OF MALTA



Led by the Grand Master, Fra' Giacomo Dalla Torre del Tempio di Sanguinetto, members, volunteers and assisted persons from 45 countries on the five continents participated to the 2019 International Lourdes pilgrimage of the Order of Malta.

Like every year on the first weekend in May, some 7,400 people, including over 1,300 malades, peacefully invaded the Marian sanctuary on the foothills of the Pyrenees for the most important of the Order's pilgrimages.

The Australian delegation consisted of 11 pilgrims from Australia and 10 from Korea. Together with the Hong Kong Association, they continued our now traditional collaboration with the Irish Association providing volunteers to accompany their Malades. This year there were 45 Irish Malades warded at Saint Claire's in Accueil Notre Dame. 25 lower dependency Irish Malades were accommodated at Hotel Roissy.

The Australian delegation formed into various teams to take care of transporting Malades to events and outings; ward duties and medical shifts. Hong Kong volunteers also manned the Global Fund for Forgotten People desk. For the first time, our volunteers assisting at the Baths where they worked in teams to assist a constant stream of pilgrims and Malades immerse and pray in waters from the spring that appeared miraculously in 1858. All volunteers reported feeling deeply moved by their experience.

The signature events at the Pilgrimage were the Eucharistic procession with the sick to the Sanctuary, the Pontifical High Mass in the Basilica of St. Pius X celebrated this year by the Archbishop of New York, Timothy Cardinal Dolan, and the candlelight Marian procession.

Each saw several thousand participants in a gentle, harmonious outpouring of faith. Our own Grotto Mass, heard under umbrellas on a wet two-degree morning, was magnificent.

Lourdes and I again was privileged to have a unique opportunity to fully experience the charism of our Order, service to the sick and the poor, while joining together with Members of the Order from across the globe in an international community of service

I learned firsthand what belonging to the Order of Malta really means devotion, service, and fellowship. Linked as it is with hands-on service, the pilgrimage offers a unique spiritual experience where we come into close contact with Our Lady. Personally, I felt very close to my late wife Terry, especially at the Grotto, the Crypt and in the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception.

Pilgrims, together with Malades, experience interior miracles—people who are ill, even dying, are able to leave Lourdes with an inner peace they did not before experience:

"Anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never thirst again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring within them, welling up to eternal life."- John 4:14."

For the 2019 Asia Pacific Camp, over 50 young people with disabilities and 100 carers and volunteers will come together in Hong Kong in October for a once in a lifetime week of fun, friendship and adventure.

Guests from all around the Asia Pacific region, including Australia, Philippines, Thailand, Hong Kong and Singapore will take part.

So far, 'Team Australia' have eight participants confirmed, who will each be accompanied by a carer. Six volunteers from Australia will also be attending the camp.

Camp, the Order of Malta has been holding summer camps for disabled youth aged between 18 to 30 for over 30 years. The goals of the camps are to forge a sense of community, promote cultural exchange and help young people to overcome personal barriers.

In 2020 it will be Australia's turn to host the camp. The host country provides accommodation, meals and activities for



the participants, carers and volunteers for the four day camp. This project is funded entirely by donations.
