BREAKFAST PROGRAM AT GRAY PRIMARY SCHOOL IN PALMERSTON, NT



Since July 2019, the Northern Central Region has been sponsoring the Breakfast Program at Grav Primary School in Palmerston, a small city half an hour from Darwin. The program provides eligible students with breakfast, recess snacks and lunch to ensure all children have access to food.

Gray School Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA) is 818, with the national average being 1,000. 63% of families whose children attend Gray Primary School fall in the bottom guarter, meaning that the majority of them come from the low socio-economic sector of our societv

On Friday 16 August, Consoeurs Maria Randazzo and Frances Booth were welcomed at the School Assembly by the Principal Ms Rebekah Stapleton. They were invited to give a talk to the students to explain what the Order of Malta is and how the Breakfast Program will provide students with nutritious meals to assist each child to fulfil their full academic potential.


Currently 62 children at Gray Primary School are sponsored through the Breakfast Program funded by Members of the Order of Malta in NT.

Sponsoring a child in the Breakfast Program costs only \$40 a year.

Although the Breakfast Program has only been active for three months it has been a wonderful success and the Order of Malta would like to expand the project to other schools. However this is reliant on additional funding becoming available.

FIGHTING AGAINST LEPROSY -DETECTING NEW CASES EARLY TO **CURB THE DISEASE**

The Order of Malta has been active in the fight against leprosy in Cambodia for over 25 years. The work of its foundation (CIOMAL) is centred around the early detection of new leprosy cases so that those affected may be treated as soon as the first signs of the disease appear and thus avoid permanent scars.

In Cambodia, CIOMAL is tackling leprosy



generous supporters of our numerous projects.

In particular I wish to thank those who have been regular donors to our various charitable causes; some of the donations might appear modest, but regular donations over time certainly make a huge impact on the funds available to support our service to the poor and the sick.

I thank all those who have donated to our charitable works, no matter what the amount. This applies also to our supporters in New Zealand, Thailand and Korea

It has been my privilege since this journal was first printed to see numerous projects come to fruition; especially the project to distribute warm coats to the homeless to become truly Australia wide (as well as in New Zealand). The Order's Medical clinic in Timor-Leste has rendered free medical assistance to over 25,000 poor in Dili since it opened.

You, our readers, helped make this possible and I trust you will continue to give the new Council the same support in the future.

by actively searching for new cases. Teams visit former patients in order to detect new cases among their neighbours and relatives and treat them as soon as possible so that the bacillus does not spread to healthy people.

In 2018, five campaigns were carried out in the provinces of Kampong Thom, Kampong Chhnang, Kampot and Kampong Cham. The teams visited 268 former leprosy patients and examined 470 relatives of theirs and 3,743 neighbours. 57 new leprosy cases were detected, including 6 children under 15.

In 2019, the teams have travelled to Rattanakiri in the Northeast of Cambodia to carry out a pilot project. In the neglected province, the fear of exclusion runs so deeply that villagers would flee when they realized they had leprosy. Local beliefs require that any person struck by a serious disease be banished from the village so that other members of the community may avoid the same fate.

In these remote areas, much work remains to be done to raise awareness and spread information so that villagers are no longer scared to receive treatment.

COATS FOR THE HOMELESS 2020 DISTRIBUTION

As the weather across Australia starts to warm up, our Coats for the Homeless project managers are planning the 2020 distribution. To ensure the coats arrive in time for winter, the manufacturing order must be placed in the coming months.

"Our 2019 project resulted in 6,000 Coats for the Homeless being distributed Australia wide by our members and partner organisations. Whilst this is a huge achievement, many homeless organisations contacted us in winter for Coats and our limited quantities had already been allocated" explains National Hospitaller John Murphy.

"I strongly urge any interested organisations to contact us now regarding purchasing additional coats so that we can do our best to increase our reach and distribution across the country to those in need" he went on to say.

The number of Coats the Order of Malta can distribute each year is largely determined by funds available for the project on ordering.

"Ideally we would like to increase our distribution numbers next year but that will rely on additional donations" said John. "Any financial support will be gratefully received."
