# SCHOOL SUPPLIES FOR STUDENTS IN NAUIYU

In June, members of the Order of Malta in the Northern Territory visited St Francis Catholic Primary School on the banks of the Daly River, two hours south of Darwin.



The local community has a population of around 510 people and is 86 percent Aboriginal. Whilst English is spoken by most residents, Ngan'gikuruggurr is the most prominent of ten local languages. In 1884 the Jesuits established a mission in the town and as a result, 75 percent of the population are Roman Catholic.

Through the through the Principal Mrs Kellie McGinley, staff, and Fr Peter, the Order of Malta provided blankets, pillows and socks for the local community and educational materials for over 60 students at the school.

In addition, a new school has been established in the area, and the Order of Malta has donated children's books to form the basis of their small school library and provided 11 students with a pack containing exercise books and other classroom necessities.

## GOD SPEAKS TO HIS CHILDREN

Members in the Northern Territory have been funding a project to distribute children's bibles to schools.

"The project originated as there are far fewer nuns and brothers now than in previous years, who provided a lot of education that would otherwise not have been available", explains member of the Order of Malta, Dr. Frances Booth. "The present generation of parents, and consequently children, have lost the benefits of this education and there is a serious concern that the Catholic faith is dying in Australia. The Priests do not have time for this important work, and in many cases the children at the schools come from countries where English is not a first language".



The project not only intends to provide religious education for children aged six to nine years old, but is also a useful tool for children and parents, for whom English is not their first language, to learn to read and write.

To date, members have distributed over 2,000 books and there is demand from schools and kindergartens for more.

# CASE STUDY: COATS FOR THE HOMELESS DISTRIBUTION IN NORTHERN NSW

Northern NSW has in recent years experienced a massive influx of people. The holiday hotpots of Ballina, Lennox Head, Byron Bay and Brunswick Heads have not only transformed into year-round holiday destinations, but desired places to live. As a result real estate prices and rents have soared to levels that far exceed affordability for even high-income earners.

Local renters have been forced out to the inland towns where poverty is already high. They also lose their social networks

and ties and become strangers in new places where support services are missing. Unemployment, homelessness, domestic violence, family dysfunction, alcoholism, drug abuse and mental health issues are all on the rise. People sleeping in vans now includes not only backpackers, but locals that are no longer able to afford the increased rents.

The Order of Malta has been active in the area and spoken to many people afflicted by the new situation. Our members and volunteers have distributed winter coats, warm socks and toiletries to the homeless on the streets. They have also formed contacts with the local Vinnies Conferences and workers at Byron Bay Community Centre, where they have spent time there talking to the homeless and distributing coats, beanies, toiletries and socks.

Volunteers and members note how being involved in the project has enriched their lives and have shared anecdotes from their distribution:

A homeless man who accepted a warm winter coat from Order of Malta indicated how important it was that it was a Velcro fastening rather than a zip, but also that it was a long dark jacket that doesn't stand out commenting that "I have to watch out because it is very dangerous for me and who I am, and I stay away from others".

A lady living in her car for many years explained, "I can no longer even afford to pay for petrol to leave Brunswick heads." She has formed a community with other homeless people who live in the bushes at Brunswick heads and they lay nets for crabs in the morning for. I spent several hours with them enjoying their company after I had handed out coats and they invited me to a lunch of crab.

One local sold her house to pay medical bills and care for her mother, who then passed away. She could not secure new accommodation locally and bought herself a van to live in and a year has passed like that.

"Despite once having a good bank balance, I could not find anything to rent as I don't have a job or a husband who works and property managers continually decline me. They don't even consider my applications anymore."

When asked why she does not move to another town she said, "I don't know anybody anywhere else as I have lived here all my life. This is where all my friends are who help me. All my support is here".

## **TIMOR-LESTE** FLOODS -**RESPONSE UPDATE**



Following the devastating floods in Timor-Leste at the beginning of April, which took 44 lives and made thousands homeless, the Order of Malta have been providing assistance to families in Hera who found refuge in a local school after flood waters drove them from their homes.

Our initial support response, ensured these families were provided with basic necessities, including hygiene items, nappies for children, bottled water and

At the beginning of May, the families were able to return to their homes, however these and their belongings sustained extensive damage. Much beyond repair.

The Order of Malta has identified households without means to rebuild following the floods and is providing aid and support.

Martinha da Conceicao (pictured) has no source of income after the floods destroyed the bananas she grows and sells. Her kitchen was also washed away and although she has built a temporary one, it is in a very bad

Living with her is daughter Maria, who is nine months pregnant and unable to return to her home due to COVID-19. Sadly all of the baby clothes she had brought were washed away during the flood. The Order of Malta is providing support with kitchen material, baby items and food.

The meal they receive is a godsend as otherwise they would not be able to afford to eat when in Darwin.

Our volunteer BBQs at Tierney House that had been on a prolonged hiatus following the implementation of COVID-19 restrictions, recommenced in March.

Tierney House is part of St Vincent's Homeless Health Service and is a 12 bedded residential unit assisting the innercity homeless population to access health care. Tierney House provides a safe and stable environment whereby residents can access assessment, treatment and support from St Vincent's Hospital and local health and support services.

The weekly BBQs see residents and volunteers working together to cook and serve the food. In doing so the volunteers provide camaraderie and support to the residents, who enjoy the social interaction during their time at the unit.

Tad spoke about the need for men to look after their mental health and the importance of sharing their feelings and concerns with a trusted friend.

The second speaker of the evening was Stuart O'Neill, author of the bestselling book "Just One Reason" a personal account of his battle with depression and suicidal thoughts on the breakdown of a relationship. Stuart spoke from the heart and captivated the audience with his honesty and openness. Stuart's message supported that of Tad's, encouraging men to stop and seek help if needed. Stuart provided all who attended the evening with a copy of his book.

Finally, Stephen Chinnock, a local poet from Coniola recited one of the poems that he had written since the fires. Stephen spoke about the importance to have an outlet to express your feelings, and how his had been through the art of his poetry. The evening concluded with a few speeches of thanks, and hours of conversation amongst the crowd and speakers.
